HOW DID YOUR ARTISTIC JOURNEY BEGIN?/WHERE DID YOUR LOVE FOR GRAPHIC DESIGN COME FROM?



IS THERE A BOOK OR MOVIE YOU DNFD LATELY?


I DNF'd (did not finish) this movie on Netflix called Damsel. Sorry Millie.

When we meet Adam and Jane, (played by Anthony Mackie and Zoe Chao) they have been stranded together in space for years after losing contact with Earth and reality is looming as they begin losing energy for the spaceship. We are briefly introduced to their life together on their spaceship- the eggs they cook in the morning, the goat they keep alive, a blueberry marijuana hybrid that Adam is trying to grow, Jane's beloved Walkman. There is a childlike quality to the animation of their time in the spaceship- the colors, the music, the glowy stars through the window, the ink drawn tattoos, and the

smiley computer they keep trying to fix. They spend a good chunk of the beginning deciding whether or not they should have sex, considering that back on Earth they have committed spouses who are maybe waiting for them, maybe not. When they make the decision to have sex, and grow closer as a result, they are met with the surprising news that their communications have been connected back to Earth and they're able to finally come back home. I was surprised when watching the second half how stark it was in contrast, and began to see how the film was purposeful in showing that the world they had developed together in space was both more vibrant than their lives back on Earth and a lot less realistic. Adam and Jane try to go back to

normal with their spouses on Earth, but they slowly begin to find that both they and their spouses' missing time together had created gaps, and it was no longer the same as it had been before they'd left for space. I really liked the story, and the two realities of space and Earth. The physicality of Earth and space containing these relationships was really interesting, almost providing the space to experiment with what it means to grow together and grow apart. I wish the second half would have been a little shorter, mostly because of the contrast of the two realities. But, I also may have just liked living in space with these two goofy characters more than living in the real life of complicated dynamics and making a living. Isn't that what romcoms are for?

I don't know if anyone was expecting another One Day adaptation. I know I wasn't, but as soon as I heard about it, I was in. I must have been craving for some heartbreak, I guess.

Story alone, I knew what I was signing myself up for. I had seen the 2011 movie adaptation. However, I'll admit, I haven't read the book yet.

I was curious to see Ambika Mod's version of Emma and Leo Woodall's version of Dexter. Minutes into the first episode, Mod's Emma felt like a friend. I would have been cheering her on right next to her best friend, Tilly

(a fav character!). Now, to be honest, I was a little nervous that Woodall's character in White Lotus was too fresh in my mind to fully immerse myself in One Day. Not to worry, Woodall brushed that image right off. Throughout the series, I loved that I knew the beats of the story and yet still felt like we explored spaces of their lives that I didn't see in the movie. There's plenty of holding back, of not being honest, and keeping themselves away from who and what they really want. There's also a lot more of their friends, lovers, and families. I did find myself wanting to explore other parts of their lives. I kept wondering about Emma's family for example. We do see them grow, learn, come apart and reunite. We see a relationship that ebbs and flows and sort of breaks away at times. We're watching lives lived, together and in tandem. The first episode confirmed why I wanted to watch. I wanted to follow Emma and Dexter.

"What are days for? Days are where we live."

It didn't matter that I knew what was going to happen in the end. Their chemistry instantly grabbed me when they first connected and even more so when they're back in her room where they're just "talking and stuff". The buildup when they're running to Dexter's flat while holding hands as Falling Colour by Vanbur starts playing in the background (min 31:40 to be exact) filled me up with a joyful eagerness and made me want to follow their journey. No matter the end, I knew it would be worth it. Like the story, it didn't matter that we knew we'd end up being hurt because missing out was maybe even more painful.

Fourth Wing & One Dark Window BY: NADINE NATIVIDAD

IF YOU'RE ON BOOKTOK OR FREQUENT BOOK-SPACES, then you've

probably heard of Fourth Wing. This is the first book of author Rebecca Yarros's Empyrean Series, with its just-as-popular sequel, Iron Flame, released this past Halloween. In the same reading circles, you might have also heard of One Dark Window, book one of The Shepherd King duology by Rachel Gillig. Comparatively, there's no doubt that Fourth Wing stands as the more popular novel of the two. Fourth Wing has accumulated over 1.4 million ratings on Goodreads while One Dark Window only has a little over 120k. Despite this difference, both garnered quite high ratings (4.32 stars for Window and 4.6 for Wing). Because I made it a personal goal to read more books this year, I decided I'd read them simultaneously. Suffice it to say, I definitely came out of that experience with a favorite between the two.

Let's start with the behemoth of a novel, Fourth Wing, which boasts a page count of 512 (though the last few are acknowledgements and other extraneous things, so really it's closer to 500). The story follows Violet Sorrengail as she prepares herself to start her studies at the notorious Basgiath War College. Originally intending to join the scribe department, Violet instead finds herself facing imminent danger

in order to be part of the Riders Quadrant instead, at her military mother's behest. Throw in the attractive (and off-limits) Xaden Riorson into the mix, and you've got yourself an enemies-to-lovers dynamic set in a world of war and dragons. What's not to love?

Well, a few things, it turns out. But I'll elaborate on that later.

On the other hand (quite literally), I had One Dark Window. Set in a kingdom surrounded by a deadly mist, we are introduced to our main character, Elspeth Spindle. Our heroine carries a terrible secret, one that could put her and her entire family in danger. Part of this secret revolves around the voice in her head, a voice she has named Nightmare. Enter Ravyn Yew, the king's nephew, who offers Elspeth a proposition she would be daft to refuse.

I finished both Fourth Wing and One Dark Window in March. For two novels pushed towards similar demographics, they couldn't be more different.

As someone whose primary genre interest is fantasy, I left the last page of Fourth Wing a little disappointed. Having tried my best to not look too deeply into any reviews, I wanted to go into the book as ignorant as

possible. That being said, one of the things that threw me off the most was the writing style. Because of its popularity and genre, I went in expecting something akin to Sarah J. Maas's A Court of Thorns and Roses, at the very least. What I got, however, was a writing style reminiscent of fanfiction quality, or even YA. This is not a slight against either of those categories. I immensely enjoy fanfiction and read it almost as often, if not more, than traditionally published novels. However, for a literary work that I hoped would have been heavily edited I expected more from its world building, sentence composition, and character development. If I had to sum up the general tone of Fourth Wing, I'd liken it to Divergent but with dragons and an R rating. When it came to One Dark Window, I had a very different reaction. While it took me months to finish Fourth Wing (despite several parties urging me to read it right away), I devoured One Dark Window in about two days. Gillig's writing style leans towards the

lyrical; her sentences flow like the creeping mist present in the story. The book's isolated setting and smaller-scale world leant it a gothic atmosphere, and you find yourself wanting to run around the stoned walls of a castle or a foggy forest in a flowing gown with a candlestick in hand. Now, I enjoy a vast magical universe as much as anyone, but there was something intriguing about a kingdom ruled by magic cards and unable to breach into the outer world. If the Brontë sisters and Card Captors had a love child, it would be *One Dark Window.*

Despite having such different reactions to the two novels, there were a lot of similarities between them. Like many fantasy and sci-fi novels, both Yarros and Gillig employed the use of epigraphs to the beginning of each chapter. These are excellent plot devices that supplement such stories because you're able to better immerse yourself in the universe. Fourth Wing's epigraphs consisted of excerpts from Navarre's history books whereas *One Dark Window* consisted of riddle-like poems that mysteriously divulged information about the magic cards and their consequences.

Another similarity between the two are the love interests. Both Xaden Riorson and Ravyn Yew are tall, dark, and handsome strangers that our main characters are not sure they should trust at the beginning of the story. I wouldn't call either of these developing relationships slow-burn, but Fourth Wing definitely escalates certain encounters much quicker than *One Dark Window*.

As far as genres go, while both *Wing and Window* can be considered fantasy, I would classify the former as Romantasy whereas the latter would be closer to a Gothic Fantasy.

Wing's romance elements of the story moreso eclipsed the fantasy aspect—leaving a half-baked world and an uninteresting magic system that I did not care about. Ultimately, I am not interested in reading the sequel, Iron Flame, much less the third installment that was just announced very recently.

Window had a wonderful balance between the magic, the plot, and the atmosphere. It's that mystery that propels the narrative forward, leaving you wanting more. With a page count just shy of 400 pages, I was ready to jump to the sequel, *Two Twisted Crowns*, as soon as possible. Reader, I did.


